10 ways to **PREPARE**

- Create an emergency kit, today! If you already have an emergency kit, review it regularly.
- Check your car. Make sure your car's tires have good tread and that your windshield wipers work well. Your headlights should always be on in the rain.
- 3. Check your house. Clear your outdoor drains and gutters of any leaves, dirt or debris. Secure trash, recycling bins and any other items that have the potential of blowing or floating away. Have weakened trees inspected by an arborist.
- **4. Got flood insurance?** Consider purchasing flood insurance. Keep in mind, most flood policies have a 30-day waiting period.
- Use sandbags. Utilize sandbags to help protect your home and property before a storm.
- Don't risk your life. Stay informed. Monitor news and weather reports and follow @ReadyLACounty on social media for news developments.
- 7. Prevent stormwater pollution. Rain washes everything into storm drains that lead to our rivers and ocean. Secure household hazardous waste with tight-fitting lids and store these items in covered areas.
- Emergency Alerts. Receive notifications on your mobile phone or email. Register at <u>alert.lacounty.gov</u>, or simply search "Alert LA County" on the web.
- Download The Works. LA County's FREE app for iPhone and Android, to report storm-related problems.



The danger of MUDSLIDE

Winter storms bring danger of mud and debris flows in steep hillside areas, especially on slopes affected by recent wildfires. Being prepared is your best defense. Know your property's risk factors. Clear drainage paths. Use sandbags to direct runoff and protect structures.

Wildfire burn areas carry special dangers. Fire not only destroys vegetation that holds soil in place, the intense heat can also affect the soil itself and prevent water absorption. Rain, mud, branches and other debris can roar down hillsides in a storm endangering lives and property. Don't be caught unprepared.

- Food and water to last three days to a week Don't forget the pets
- First-aid kit
- Flashlights (and extra batteries)
- Radio (and extra batteries)
- Medications (over-the-counter and prescription)

- Cash and important documents
- Clothing and sturdy shoes
- Tools (wrench, duct tape, fire extinguisher, sturdy gloves, whistle)
- Sanitation and hygiene supplies
